**PREFACE** 

# A City of Human Rights and a Happy Kaohsiung

What is the meaning of human rights? What human rights does Taiwan need today? In the past, many political parties, organizations, and religious groups took to the streets to protest against injustice and the deprivation of human rights. We cannot help but wonder what kind of human rights Taiwan needs. Where are Taiwan's human rights?

The so-called "human rights," as mentioned in the first part of Article 1 of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, "All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights." Article 2 states that: "Everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in this Declaration, without distinction of any kind, such as race, colour, sex, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth or other status. Furthermore, no distinction shall be made on the basis of the political, jurisdictional or international status of the country or territory to which a person belongs," as is the basic definition of human rights given by the United Nations. Therefore, the most basic definition of human rights should be: "human rights are inherent basic rights and freedom, which should be given regardless of race, gender, and social class. No society or government should arbitrarily deprive one of one's human rights, nor abuse such rights, while opportunities for personal expression and development should be actively provided, thus achieving the goals of respect for individuals' dignity and the pursuit of a better life." Hence, in terms of human rights-related issues, the human dignity of concern to us is at stake.

Regardless of the era or history, everyone should be entitled to his or her basic rights depending on the nature and dignity of the person, which include: freedom, an equal right to life, and development. In view of Taiwan's history and development, according to the ROC constitution that protects the equality of race, gender, education, political party, class, and religion, every citizen of the Republic of China is given freedom and equal human rights, as stipulated in Article 7 of the Constitution of the Republic of China. Therefore, the promotion of human rights ideas and work should be about the continuous exploration and respect for the law of dignified humanity and the importance given to the thinking and realization of individual respect and respect for others by members of society, which are the basic concepts of human rights. Everyone in a just society should comply with the mutual rights and responsibilities, and contracts. Therefore, concepts including respect, cooperation, fairness, and justice are considered important parts of advocacies of human rights.

#### **PREFACE**

Kaohsiung is a city of human rights. In the past, many glorious and heroic human rights movements took place in Kaohsiung, and the human rights fragments and democracy-based moving stories of blood and tears were accumulated. What are left are pages of role models of the progress of human rights worthy of study. Following the accumulation process, Kaohsiung is now more concerned about and has more respect for human rights than any other city. In 2008, December was set as "Kaohsiung's Human Rights Month"; in 2009, the concept of "human rights city" was implemented, and the "human rights school" was set up in the Formula Boulevard Kaohsiung MRT Station, thereby incorporating the concept of human rights into public life. In city governance, this is the practice of human rights knowledge and values; we deeply believe that human rights are the basic values of every city and are the greatest common divisor of decision-making tools and of social peace and prosperity; the true meaning of governance lies in the practice of human rights values, while the prospects of any city rely on laying roots for true human rights, public safety, and sustainable city development. This democracy and the accompanying human rights values must be rooted in the heart of every citizen. We expect to join in efforts to head toward the common goal of creating a "city of human rights and happy Kaohsiung."

## Whose Human Rights? The Voices of Human Rights from Urban Residents

The field of human rights has always been an exchange field for docking, collision, or even confrontation arising from the world's different cultures, values, and ideologies. The issue of human rights must be explored and understood in the context of modernization and globalization, while cities are cross-border political and social carriers where people dwell in the era of modernization and globalization. The construction of human rights cities not only involves the specific protection of the rights of urban people and the promotion of substantial contents, the urban residents' cross-cultural understanding of human rights, the establishment of human rights norms and consensus, and the dialogues among them also have deep implications.

In the era of globalization with a diversity of assets, human beings should join forces rather than split up. They should engage in joint efforts to ensure the full realization of the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* that presents the world's human rights cultures. A nation's human rights culture is a representation of the people's awareness of human rights. Only by seeing beyond the narrow sense of the political identity of citizens and regarding the full realization of human rights without discrimination as part of human dignity itself (rather than a gift) can the contents of the constructed human rights culture suffice as the healthy blood marrow of the "human rights country" and "human rights cities."

The protection and promotion of global human rights not only rely on the consensus reached by the world's global leaders on international human rights norms, but also rely on the values and behaviors of citizens at social levels in relation to the concept of national sovereignty, specifically human rights awareness and policy requirements. As a harmonious, interactive, and open society with shared values, its significance lies in the service type of relationship between the nation and society rather than the ruling type of relationship. Through the active responses of the local groups on human rights issues, the nation's governance can be made more transparent, accountable, and trustworthy, thereby laying a solid foundation for the protection of the citizens' basic human rights.

The book titled "100 Human Rights Aspirations for the R.O.C. Centennial" contains a record of the urban residents' inner desire for human rights to convey the human rights views of the residents with different backgrounds. During the R.O.C. Centennial celebration, residents from different cities will gather in Kaohsiung, the city that longs for and pursues democracy, freedom, and human rights, for the R.O.C. Centennial- human rights aspirations. Because the voices for human rights come from ordinary residents, they are more worthy of everyone's self-reflection and inspection as they are the sources of human rights awareness to be implemented and promoted. On the occasion of the R.O.C. Centennial, the one hundred wishes of the urban residents not only symbolize markings of Taiwan's one hundred years of democracy and human rights, but also urge the government and everyone not to forget the implications of the human rights policies when constructing the human rights country and its cities.


